On 13 August The Age newspaper published an article entitled: Authorities brace for ugly scenes as Australian 'patriots' plan mosque protests. Across the country on October 10, ugly scenes are expected at mosques with activists planning co-ordinated protests against Muslim migration and Islam. These protests will coincide with anti-Islam protests in Canada, parts of Europe, and the United States. Mr Shermon Burgess, told followers in a video that "the whole world is going to rally against Islam", and called on Australians to follow suit. # Community speaks up as planned anti-Islamisation protest spark controversy across Melbourne

The upcoming anti-Islam protests have caused controversy across Victoria as authorities prepare for ugly scenes. The protesters are expected at mosques around the country in October, with far-right wing activists heading the riots against Islam and the migration of Muslims into the country.

The protests are coinciding with anti-Islam demonstrations stemming from ex-Marine Jon Ritzheimer in parts of Europe, Canada and the U.S. Mr Ritzheimer has also informed Americans to bring guns to the protest.

In Melbourne, this call for support was backed by the **United Patriots Front**, who identify themselves as fringe groups of the **Reclaim Australia** movement and others. But the planned protests are creating a strong opposition from Muslims and

non-Muslims alike. Monash University student and young Muslim \*Amy says the protests are 'only causing more unnecessary fear.'

"People just need to be educated and know first of all the basics," "I'm not saying they need to know everything about our religion, but the basics and this will help reduce the fear of the unknown," she said. Born and raised in Australia, \*Amy says there needs to be more understanding from both sides and there is no need for protests against Islam in Australia. "If we had done something wrong as a whole, then a protest would be understandable but there are so many of us here who live here peacefully and have our faith while also being part of the wider Australian community," she said.

"I feel like we all just need to get to know each other and respect each other's differences as well as realise we have common ground."



Groups such as the **No Room for Racism** movement have defended Muslims, **stating** earlier in the year during April riots in Fed Square 'immigrants are welcome, racists are not.'\*Ali, Islamic imam and religious scholar, says Muslims are 'just as much to blame' for the frequent uprisings over the past year, including the protest against the completion of the Bendigo Mosque in August this year. "This has two sides of the coin; a lack of understanding from the community and a lack of practice and implementation of correct Islam from some sects of the Muslim community," he said. The imam from Melbourne, who converted to Islam over 20 years ago is a qualified ustaz (teacher) in Islamic studies. "I would like to

see positive change and positive reform, from all sides of the fence, especially from the Muslim

community so people can see us for who we really are and not what they heard or as mainstream media has portrayed us to be. He also says that the Muslim community 'do not need to apologise', however need to work together to eradicate all forms of extremism in the community. "This is individual people who do not represent Islam and what our religion teaches but we do need to admit we have sects that we need to educate, then things may move forward and then the wider Australian community may be more accepting. "If that's possible or not, I don't know....but we can all hope."

The anti-Islamisation protests will be held on October 10 across Victoria.

### Eid-ul-Adha

Eid-ul-Adha is celebrated in the same way as Eid-ul-Fitr, although the special feature of Eid-ul-Adha is the Hajj and animal sacrifice. The performers of Haj are called haji. The rituals carried out during Hajj has been prescribed by the Prophet Muhammad (Peace be upon Him) based on the events of Prophet Ibrahim (A.S.) and his family.


Eid-ul-Adha is based on the concept of sacrifice.

It is made for Allah alone, in memory of the great sacrifice made by the Prophet Ibrahim (A.S.). The meat is divided into three portions. One is kept for the family; the second is given to friends and relatives; and the remaining third portion to the poor and needy. Eid-ul-Adha is celebrated towards the end of Haj and serves as a reminder to submit to Allah's will at all times.
