Sarah's views on hijab

Coming from the country side in Australia, I was never exposed to Islam. I knew nothing about it. I thought of it as an oppressive religion, whenever I heard about it. It wasn't until I went to Malaysia, that God guided me in ways I never expected, Subhan'Allah.

I learned that Muslim women also have rights, which were legally given even before the West did. Meeting impressive women like Sisters in Islam and Marina Mahathir, also inspired me to divulge into Islam more. I found that I could have a career and be a Muslim. However, it wasn't until a year later, I reverted, Alhamdulillah.



Islam is a beautiful way of life to praise and worship Allah as One God every single day. While it is not easy to explain to friends and family, I wouldn't have it any other way. I did a lot of research and interviewed many Muslim and even non-Muslim women on why women choose to cover up. I also learned a lot from my Imam and his wife, who taught me it is for women to be recognized more for their intelligence, not be as exposed, to this sometimes, overly sexual world and to keep your beauty for your husband.

I've met many wonderful, intelligent women who chose to wear Hijab, which is her right. Dressing more modestly came naturally after reverting. I hope to one day wear Hijab every single day, In'sha'Allah. God truly is the Turner of Hearts – I never in my wildest dreams thought I would become a Muslim, yet, He opened my heart and has blessed me in more ways than I could ever imagine or repay Him for.


Understanding Journeys Event

UMSLV was approached by Lisa Price to help organise an event to show Australian women's support to Muslim women, given the current global climate. So, we, together with Lisa Price, Debra Carnduff, Val Prokopiv and others organised an Understanding Scarves event in November 2014. This event was about creating an awareness of Muslim women and their culture, by providing a safe space for women from the wider community to ask all their burning questions. Those who attended this successful event requested that we organise another event.

The organising committee of Understanding Scarves organised the Understanding Journeys event that took place at the Traralgon Library on 16 March, during cultural diversity week. This event was about creating an awareness and acceptance of people from diverse cultural backgrounds living in the region and to acknowledge their journeys and contributions to modern day Australia. We used the living libraries concept where people came to the library and borrowed a book that was a person. That person told her story.

Every one of us has been on a journey. This event gave people the opportunity to share their stories through the use of oral narratives. In the lead up to the event, one of our books said "It was a very difficult time, and now 61 years later I get to tell my story", which we found very touching. The readers thoroughly enjoyed listening to the stories of journeys experienced by Maltese, Malaysian, Nigerian, Filipina, Nepalese women amongst others.

Allah says in the Quran: "Oh mankind! Allah has put you into nations and tribes so that you may get to know one another. Verily the most honoured among you in the sight of Allah is the most righteous". Getting to know one another is what the organising committee aimed to achieve with Understanding Journeys. Book Review Sarah Price

'You can be the happiest woman in the world'

This treasure chest of reminders by Dr Aid al-Qarni is surprisingly refreshing. It's simple, easy to read and brings up some very good points on how to be happy as a believing woman. Now...I was sceptical at first (because how can a man possibly know how a woman can be truly happy?) but once I divulged further into this book I found his reminders concise, accurate and quite beautiful. This book made such an impression on me that I am instilling some of his sound advice into my own life. His advice is not harsh or unreasonable...it incorporates quotes from the Qur'an, stories from Eastern and Western characters, and provides a quietly charming account of what makes women naturally happy. And of course, every chapter also reminds us that the key to true happiness is placing your trust in Allah (swt) and being kind to those around you. Truly worthwhile read - not just for those going through anxiety or depression but also just as daily reminders to encourage women to become better Muslims.
